Art Through the Centuries is a multi-media art class using the world's great artists as inspiration. The class will "meet" an artist at the beginning of most sessions by looking at a famous work. They will use new art vocabulary to discuss the piece. The rest of the time will be spent on creating art sparked by the artist's technique, medium, or subject matter. My unique approach weaves art history, art instruction, and God moments with fantastic art projects!

The students will be getting a good general overview of art history as well as experiencing a variety of art methods such as: painting, sculpture, printmaking, and more. Basic drawing principles will be covered using the five shape families and the seven secrets of perspective, as well as principles of portraits and figure drawing.

How does Art Work?

Art is an expressive language. Let's create (and get a bit messy) with the many different art mediums and materials together!

In ArtWorks, we will explore the visual Elements of Art through line, shape, form, value, space, color, and texture. As our year progresses, the students will dive deeper into an understanding of the Principles of Art: rhythm, balance, contract, proportion, harmony, variety, and movement. This course will provide opportunities to develop art skills and techniques, while we learn art history, art appreciation, art production, and art criticism. Art teaches creative thinking, problem solving, and decision making skills in the process. Your artist will learn how to express themselves through their art!

We will experiment with many different art techniques in mixed media using paint, watercolors, color pencils, graphite pencils, oil pastels, clay, printmaking, etc...

Students will need to supply their own sketchbook and smock.

Lastly, students will exhibit a few of their ArtWorks in the Year-end Celebration.

Basic Drawing is an online course. It will meet on Wednesday morning from 10:10-11:05.

Basic Drawing (online) will focus on drawing as an artistic skill, a foundation for creating works of art. The approach is classical, honoring such enduring aesthetic values as beauty, form, harmony, and proportion. Many examples from art history will be used to illustrate these concepts.

Initially, with the traditional basic drawing materials of charcoal and pencil, and using simple geometric forms as subject matter; the drawing principles of proportion, perspective, light and shadow, and composition will be studied and developed. Color will be introduced in projects using colored pencils. As the academic year progresses, projects will grow in complexity, starting with still lifes, perspective drawing, drapery studies, and then basic human figure proportions, leading up to the major project of illustrating a Biblical scene or verse. The class will conclude with two portrait projects.

The educational emphasis will be on artistic discipline (hard work and practice), and individual improvement in drawing skills. Students are not graded in relation to other students; rather, they are guided to grow significantly beyond their initial skill levels which are brought to the class.

- 18" x 24" drawing pad (drawing paper, not newsprint)
- Drawing board with clips (or an equivalent rigid board) to hold the 18" x 24" pad
- Kneaded eraser
- 1 package of medium vine charcoal (several sticks)
- 1 black 2B Conte Crayon
- 1 medium charcoal pencil
- Soft graphite pencil (Ebony or graphite stick)
- 1 #2 traditional graphite pencil
- 4 Prismacolor (or equivalent) colored pencils: red, blue, yellow, and black.
- Sketchbook (approx. 9" x 12")

If your child is ready to jump into art and express their creativity this is a great place to start. A student may take this class for three years, as different projects/lessons are offered each year. Most sessions begin with an introduction to an art principle, artistic style, or featured artist. Artists then combine the mini lesson with their own ideas to create unique works of art.

Start with Art students will have the opportunity to do the following learning activities:

•Experience a variety of media including acrylic, watercolor, soft pastel, oil pastel, marker, pen/pencil, textiles, tile, recyclables, metal, plaster, clay, and natural materials.

•Try various art processes such as drawing, painting, sculpture, modeling, weaving, basic stitchery, printmaking, and collage.

•Incorporate art elements of line, color, shape, form, value, space, and texture.

•Explore design principles of balance, proportion, contrast, variety, emphasis, unity, rhythm, and pattern; and appreciate the art of famous artists and various cultural groups.

*The \$50 materials fee covers all art materials, craft supplies, utensils, smocks, sketch books, and teaching aids.

** No minimum age exceptions permitted. Please note that young artists need to be developmentally ready to separate from parents and participate in 30 minutes of moderately focused work.

Destination Imagination is a global organization that facilitates a creativity competition each year (learn more at www.DIVirginia.org or DestinationImagination.org). For the Team Challenge experience, a small team develops a solution to a project-based, STEAM challenge. Team Challenges are new each year and may have a specific educational focus such as: technical, scientific, or engineering. Although each Team Challenge has a specific focus, each one incorporates various elements to make them multi-disciplinary and cross-curricular (i.e., the engineering challenge will have an artistic or storytelling component). Students in this course will be a part of one team who decide together which team challenge they will work to creatively solve throughout the year. They will work to develop their solution and present it live at the Virginia state tournament in March 2025. Teams are responsible for designing and creating 100% of their Team Challenge solution. Absolutely no interference from non-team members (no research, idea, or solution from family, friends, etc) is allowed- this is a critical component so the team can take full ownership of their solution! The teacher (i.e. Team Manager) for this course, guides the creative process and helps keep the team on track, but is not allowed to interfere with the team's solution either. Another part of the course will be practicing and completing Instant Challenges. Instant Challenges are quick, creative and critical-thinking exercises that build teamwork and reinforce problem-solving skills like rapid ideation and implementation. Instant Challenges can be task-based, performance-based, or a combination of both. The team will practice these challenges each week and will complete one together at the tournament in March.

Both the Team Challenge and Instant Challenge components teach and develop the creative process. The team members will grow in their problem solving, critical thinking, communication, teamwork, presentation skills, perseverance and more. It is a really fun way to learn together!

This course requires a commitment to attend the DI- Virginia state tournament in March 2025. Each team will also need to provide two adult volunteers for the tournament (the Team Manager cannot be one of the volunteers). There may be optional team meetings outside of ACTS, at an alternate location, as tournament time approaches (January - March 2025) if the team feels they need more time to prepare and practice. Homework will vary throughout the course duration depending on what the team needs to do for their solution and how they choose to delegate the responsibilities.

While this course is offered as an ACTS class, ACTS cannot sponsor or be responsible for competitions, transportation, etc. for this class. The materials fee covers the upfront cost to register the team with Destination Imagination, a rulebook for the specific Team Challenge chosen by the team and provided supplies to utilize in class (paper, markers, scissors, tape, etc). The course tuition covers additional expenses related to the Team and Instant Challenges and Virginia state tournament. Families are responsible for transportation to the tournament or any additional team meetings happening outside of ACTS without any liability falling on ACTS. There are no textbooks or additional materials required. Age exceptions will not be granted for this class in order to keep the team in compliance with the competition rules.

Destination Imagination is a global organization that exists to inspire and equip youth to imagine and innovate through the creative process. The DI SkillFire curriculum introduces and reinforces skills like: teamwork/ communication, creative thinking, dramatic play/ self-expression, resource awareness/ exploration of material properties, literary analysis/ research, technical design, goal-setting/ project management, improvisation, and rapid ideation. For this class we will focus on learning one new skill at a time. The skill will be introduced and we will do activities that reinforce understanding and build this skill. Girls and boys that participate in this class will enjoy a hands-on, active learning experience.

In an era where the line between politics and pop culture increasingly blurs, understanding the complexities of our modern world has never been more crucial. "From Politics to Pop Culture" is a dynamic, high school level course designed to engage students with the current events that shape our society, from the floors of Congress to the trends on social media. Through a comprehensive exploration of contemporary issues based on this country's founding and constitutional principles, this course aims not only to inform but also to empower students to critically engage with the world around them.

Current Events Analysis: Students will dive deep into the latest headlines, developing an understanding of the political, social, and cultural factors at play.

Critical Thinking and Debate: Through structured debates and discussions, students will learn the art of presenting well-reasoned arguments and considering different perspectives.

Media Literacy: In an age of information overload, learning to discern credible sources and understand media bias is essential. This course will equip students with the skills needed to navigate the media landscape effectively.

Commitment to Learning: Students are expected to demonstrate a genuine interest in understanding current events and their implications on society.

Consistent Engagement: Regular participation in discussions and assignments is key to developing a well-rounded perspective on the topics covered. To this end, families can choose between a regular and Honors format for this class. All students are expected to complete reading assignments, participate in class discussion, and come to class with a current event they would like to discuss. For those who wish to use the class for high school credit and are planning on attending college, there will be additional written assignments and quizzes.

One of the cornerstone principles of this course is fostering an environment where differing opinions can coexist respectfully. Students are encouraged to:

Listen Actively: Understand and consider viewpoints different from your own.

Communicate Thoughtfully: Express your opinions clearly without diminishing those of others. We will also cover the value in being "devil's advocate" as arguing the opposite side provides one with a stronger platform in which to counter various beliefs.

The goal is not to tell students what to think about the various issues discussed, but rather to equip them with the critical thinking skills necessary to form their own opinions. To this end, students will be encouraged to:

Question Assumptions: Challenge both personal and widely-held beliefs about the world.

Seek Multiple Perspectives: Look beyond mainstream narratives to understand the full scope of an issue.

Develop Independent Thought: Cultivate the ability to think independently, supported by evidence and reasoned argument.

"From Politics to Pop Culture" is more than just a course; it's a journey into the heart of what it means to be an informed and engaged citizen in the 21st century. Students who embark on this journey will come away with a deeper understanding of the world around them, equipped to navigate the complexities of modern society with confidence and insight. A basic understanding of this country's founding, as well as of the Declaration of Independence and Constitution, will be extremely helpful but is not required. To this end, students will receive a list of suggested textbooks and other sources in case they need extra support in understanding issues. (Please know this may also affect how long homework takes each week.) Also, depending on what is going on in the world, there will most likely be weeks that mature content is discussed. Please keep this in mind before registering your student for the class. *Mature 9th graders considered

Teen Book Club is a course that will provide a relaxed environment for students to gather together for the purpose of reading and discussing quality literature without the pressure of having to complete quizzes, tests, or essays. In addition to reading core texts, students will familiarize themselves with the backgrounds of various authors. Rounding out the book club experience, "paired text" articles and essays often will be provided to offer context for specific readings.

Students enrolled in Teen Book Club will be expected to read sections of assigned texts (and possibly supplemental readings) weekly and to participate in substantive, analytical discussions of literary works. Students will practice skills of literary analysis, but they also will be encouraged to personally connect with reading selections in God-honoring and life-affirming ways.

The Teen Book Club proposed reading list includes novels, collections of short stories, one non-fiction book, and one film. Novels may be purchased (new or used) and/or borrowed; www.bookfinder.com is an excellent web site for comparing prices for new and used books. The course materials fee covers handouts and teacher-provided collections of short stories. Students also will need a binder or folder for keeping handouts and short story collections.

All text selections have been chosen specifically for their potential to inspire lively, meaningful, and spiritually fruitful discussions. However, some texts contain mature themes and are best suited only for emotionally and intellectually mature teens. As parents are the God-appointed primary educators of their children, it is ultimately up to each parent to examine the proposed reading list and decide if the Teen Book Club course is an appropriate fit for his or her child.

This course is designed to prepare 7th-9th grade students for high school level writing. Students will learn the writing process, including pre-writing, drafting, and editing of informative, persuasive, descriptive, narrative, analytical, and expository compositions and research papers. As part of this course, students will read and respond to classic short stories and books, learning strategies for interacting with literature and writing essays. All literature will be taught from a Biblical perspective.

This course is writing intensive, and will include short weekly writing assignments, building to longer essays and research papers throughout the year. The course will also include mini-grammar lessons and some short grammar assignments in order to facilitate writing with accuracy.

This course is designed for 8–10th grade students. This class equips students to write at the high school level. It focuses on the essay: the importance of following a writing process, crafting strong thesis statements and topic sentences, and developing ideas in paragraphs. Students will learn about argumentative and other academic forms of writing; the importance of audience and purpose; and documentation of sources in MLA style. Students will learn the importance of organizing, drafting, revising, and editing their essays.

Grammar proficiency: Prior to enrolling, students should be able to write complete sentences and know how to avoid fused sentences (run-ons) and sentence fragments. Grammar will be addressed throughout the year as needed, especially focusing on major editing errors, such as fused sentences, comma splices, sentence fragments, apostrophe errors, pronoun-antecedent agreement errors, and subject-verb agreement errors.

Writing: This course is writing intensive. Students will read and respond to a variety of essays and articles to learn how writers organize their ideas and support their arguments with details, examples, and research. They will learn to transfer those techniques to writing their own essays.

Students will write five essays: the personal narrative, the comparison-contrast essay, and three argumentative essays.

Required materials: A notebook, at least 4 different colored highlighters, computer access with a printer, and an email address that contains the student's last name.

Provided materials: A booklet containing writing instructions, the articles and essays we will read, grammar/mechanics handouts, and essay topics.

Advanced Creative Writing Workshop is a one-year, repeatable course designed to inspire and challenge experienced student-writers by giving them more advanced writing assignments in a number of creative genres, such as fiction (stories), poetry, drama, song lyrics, and creative nonfiction.

Each semester, students will have the chance to focus on a more extended piece they develop over a number of weeks. We will develop an understanding of genres by exploring (and playing with) creative conventions and techniques. We will study historical/literary examples, sometimes imitating their effects for practice, and sometimes purposefully violate conventions to see what happens when we play with audience expectations.

A big part of the course is learning that good creative writing (and all writing) is about more than writing the first draft. It's also about revising and editing. The class will include many "workshop" (seminar-style) days, during which writers can read (or have someone else read) their ongoing work aloud, and the class will provide constructive feedback. These feedback sessions will be voluntary for the writers.

* Textbook: The course has no formal text, although we may read up to four novels, plays, or screenplays, to be determined. Most readings are provided on the course website (www.crosswaterarts.com) and in handouts. Students will also watch web-based instructional videos on elements of creative writing.

American Literature 8-10 is a course designed to introduce 8th- to 10th-grade students to classic works of American literature. Students will read or view selections from a variety of genres, including non-fiction, fiction, poetry, drama, and film. They will become familiar with literary principles and terms. Although the course does not have an essay-writing component, students will have an opportunity to explore their understanding of their reading by responding to short-answer questions, discussion questions, and quizzes. Students will be expected to participate in class and occasionally discuss important ideas about the works in small groups.

We will take a chronological tour of classic American literature, starting from the beginnings of American literature, where we will look at some writings of early explorers; women who were held captive by Native Americans; pioneers; and slaves, and on into modern times. Notable authors include Mark Twain, Emily Dickinson, William Faulkner, and Ernest Hemingway, among others.

Shorter works of literature (poetry and short stories) will be bound in a book I will provide and which is covered by the materials fee. Novels should be purchased or borrowed. Students will need a notebook for taking notes and keeping handouts.

Grammar: Parents should assess their student's proficiency in grammar to ensure that it is at a tenth-grade level prior to this course. College Prep Writing will begin with a grammar review and include periodic grammar reviews as needed.

Research and Rhetoric: Students will conduct in-depth research using scholarly sources. They will follow the writing process by writing multiple essays and participating in peer reviews.

- Written responses to current topics
- A research paper
- A poetry explication
- A literary analysis essay

Creative Writing is a full-year, repeatable course designed to spark and build students' interest and confidence in writing. The point is to foster creativity through challenging but fun assignments in creative genres that include stories (fiction), graphic stories, poetry, drama, screenwriting, song lyrics, and creative non-fiction.

While using creativity to invent stories and blast through obstacles sometimes caused by fear of "doing it wrong" when it comes to writing, students will also learn how to write more effectively. They'll discover that the effects they enjoy in reading or watching movies—e.g., surprise, tension, or fondness for some characters and dislike of others—don't just "happen." Instead, they are often the result of intentional choices that students can use, too.

We will also learn that good writing, creative or otherwise, is about more than writing the first draft or avoiding mistakes. It's also about using good writing techniques (e.g., use of concrete details), effective revision—and yes, proofreading final drafts well.

In-class lessons will include plenty of writing, and many class days will include exercises, games, and other activities designed to foster and stretch creativity. Often, we will write freely from prompts and then focus on revising our pieces to make the writing more effective—e.g., to improve character development, improve the detail, or just make it funnier.

* Textbook: The course has no formal text, although we may read up to four novels, plays, or screenplays, to be determined. Most readings are provided on the course website (www.crosswaterarts.com) and in handouts. Students will also watch web-based instructional videos on elements of creative writing.

We will delve deeply into the themes and Christian messages from their works.

Students should be strong readers as this is a reading-intensive course. Students will be expected to read and respond weekly to literature through homework, quizzes, short writing assignments, and project presentations. Class participation is a required component as well.

Students will learn and review using a systematic and multisensory structured phonics approach. Through movement, games, songs, storybooks, and hands-on activities, we will cover learning letter names and their sounds, alphabet order, matching lower to upper case letters, consonants/vowels, counting syllables, blending sounds together, reading words/phrases/sentences, and handwriting. If the class is ready, we will move on to digraphs and long vowels. We will also work on other areas of literacy such as rhyming, comprehension, vocabulary, and reading fluency.

Prerequisite: Algebra 1

This is a high school level Algebra II course. Class time will focus on new concepts (factoring, rational expressions, coordinate geometry, variation, systems of equations, powers, roots, exponents, radicals, imaginary numbers, quadratic equations and more). We will also talk briefly about homework problems. The newest version of the textbook is long, but it has tons of daily review. We will not be going through the entire textbook, but will cover over half (some topics saved for PreCalculus).

Students will be expected to complete problem sets and tests at home, bringing corrected work to class. Take home tests will be given periodically throughout the year. Parents are responsible for ensuring that all assigned work is completed. Teacher will make notes on homework, if needed, and grade tests.

I ask all students to take a readiness test, to make sure that Algebra 1 skills are strong enough. Extra mandatory tutoring sessions may be needed to solidify skills.

This course is high school level and covers geometry and its associated logic from a Christian viewpoint. The textbook is Geometry Seeing Doing Understanding Third Edition (or 2017 version) by Harold Jacobs.

The author clearly loves geometry and passes along his enthusiasm to the reader. The text begins with a presentation of deductive reasoning and how it is essential for the study of Geometry. Jacobs Geometry then progresses through Euclidean geometry starting with points, lines, planes, angles and polygons. Further material includes area, right triangles, geometric transformations, congruency and similarity, trigonometric functions, and three-dimensional objects. The text finishes with a chapter on non-Euclidean geometry.

Logical skills are developed since proofs of geometric theorems are woven throughout the exercises. Asking "why" is emphasized, and abundant real-world applications are given. Students are expected to be current on homework problems, prepared to discuss the homework, and to have familiarized themselves with the next week's new concepts.

Completion of this course will greatly aid any student preparing for a standardized test, as geometric concepts factor heavily in PSAT and SAT math sections.

Homework: Accountability is requested through turn in checked and corrected homework. Class time will allow for review of any difficulties students had in the previous week's work but will focus on teaching and mastering new concepts. Mrs. King requests that parents carefully proctor closed book quizzes and tests, since there is not enough class time to test during the period. Students can anticipate 3-4 hours of homework a week.

We will spend the year getting you ready for college math and science classes. First in our agenda is to learn all the helpful uses of a graphing calculator and how it can speed up and help you in all math and science classes. The graphing calculator will be used in most classes, calculator app is not acceptable, because it cannot be used on any standardized tests.

This course is a study of higher mathematics. Pre-calculus can be thought of as a continuation of an algebra journey: Early Pre-calc is a review of Algebra 2 concepts, while late Pre-calc is a bridge to Calculus. We will learn how to use a valuable tool in math and life - the graphing calculator.

Parents and students who have struggled with math in the past can benefit from this course, where Mrs. King focuses on real-world applications of math. Students at this level have a strong need both to know why they are learning and what the goal of learning is. This course speaks to both those questions throughout the course so that math is less of an isolated subject and more of a multi-disciplinary tool to understand the world around us.

Concepts include:

- Number theory, the number line, real numbers, complex numbers
- Study of real numbers including rational and irrational
- Properties of functions including domain, range, odd, even, one-to-one, periodicity, symmetry, asymptotes, intercepts and zeros.
- Inverse and composite functions

- Graphing, shifting and stretching functions
- Understanding and interpreting functions using algebra, graphic calculators or table of values

- The Binomial Theorem and Pascal's Triangle
- Trigonometry

This action-packed class will feature 'hands on' learning experiences for K-2 students. Through demonstrations, model making, and experimentation, students will grasp scientific principles as the teacher highlights important concepts. Scientific skills of observing, sequencing, classifying, measuring, questioning, predicting, and experimenting will be emphasized. Once a semester, an exceptional educational video that goes with the topic may be shown.

An occasional report will be assigned (approximately two to three per year).

Science Explore topics follow a three-year sequence, listed below, to assure that students have a well-rounded science background from grades K-6. There are no prerequisites for enrolling in either Year A, B, or C. Reading material and experiments vary in each level of study (K-2, 3-4, & 5-6). When a student repeats a year of topics at the next level up, they will build on their knowledge base, study each topic in more depth and be further challenged.
