# **Course: Photography through Art Appreciation**

### **Class Description:**

This engaging and enriching class combines the principles of photography with the depth of art appreciation. By intertwining these two disciplines, students will gain a holistic understanding of both the technical and artistic aspects of photography, while also cultivating a deeper appreciation for the visual arts. To understand that creativity runs through each of us is truly a gift that God has given us. It is so important to be able to harness that gift and, in this case, harness it through the medium of photography. Within this class students will truly grasp what photography is; in its entirety, and how to use it in a way that expresses who they are and who God has created them to be. Within this class they will understand the aspects of photography, conceptualization when creating photography, how to present a photo, and have exposure to postproduction when editing photos. They will gain understanding in story telling through the medium of photography by conceptualizing appreciation, evaluation, authentication, and exhibition. This will be done through lectures, discussions, hands-on projects, and presentations, students will develop essential skills in photography, critical thinking, and visual literacy.

### **Course Objectives:**

- 1. To introduce students to the fundamentals of photography, including composition, lighting, exposure, and camera techniques.
- To explore various genres of photography, such as portrait, landscape, documentary, and experimental, through the lens of art history and theory.
- 3. To encourage critical thinking and analysis by examining photographs as artistic expressions within cultural, social, and historical contexts.
- 4. To foster creativity and self-expression through hands-on photography projects and assignments.
- 5. To develop visual literacy skills and the ability to communicate ideas effectively through images.
- 6. To define the concepts of art and photography and their significance in contemporary society.
- 7. To identify and analyze the various aspects and techniques of photography.
- 8. To explore the practical applications of photography in different contexts.
- 9. To understand the principles of light and composition in still life photography.
- 10. To examine discipline-based concepts within the realm of art education.
- 11. To study and analyze the works of famous photographers.
- 12. To conduct research on a selected photographer and present findings.
- 13. To develop aesthetic sensibility and analyze photographic works.
- 14. To trace the history and evolution of photography as an art form.
- 15. To explore the genre of documentary photography and its role in storytelling.

- 16. To understand the presentation techniques of digital and print photography, including the importance of artist statements.
- 17. To gain proficiency in using Photoshop and Lightroom for photo editing and manipulation.
- 18. To apply Photoshop and Lightroom skills in a project inspired by Dorthea Lange's work.

**Prerequisites**: No prior knowledge needed. DSLR cameras are encouraged but are not required and phone cameras are acceptable.

**Homework:** There will be one assignment a week. Independent student time will be required: approximately 1 to 2 hours.

#### **Course Supplies:**

- Cameras no specific digital cameras---all types are welcome (DSLR, phone, etc.).
- There will be some research done in class periodically so laptops would be helpful but not required.
- Post-production work will also require the use of a laptop in the final weeks.
- Adobe Creative Cloud specifically Lightroom
- Chatbooks Account (We will set this up in class)
- Notepad and pencils

## **Conclusion:**

The proposed class offers students a unique opportunity to explore photography as both a technical skill and an expressive art form, while also deepening their understanding and appreciation of art history and theory. Through a combination of theory, practice, and critical analysis, students will emerge with a well-rounded perspective on photography and its place within the broader context of visual culture.
